#### ION VANDAGRIFF'S VERACITY FOR THE PAST ENSURES HIS OWN MARK IN LOCAL HISTORY

Looking back at the beginning of his journey, it's hard to think there was a time when people took little notice of Weatherford historian Jon Vandagriff.

Over the decades, the once shy boy grew in confidence and made friends and business acquaintances with Texas Governor Preston Smith, Speaker of the House Jim Wright, US Secretary of the Treasury Lloyd Bentsen, Fort Worth Cats manager Bobby Bragan, as well as local community leaders Roy Grogan, Nolan Queen, Harry Hopkins and Larry Fowler.

But when he was helping organize his 50th high school class reunion and contacted the class valedictorian he was recalled as the "little kid with the short hair."

And it's no wonder his classmates took little notice of him. Vandagriff spent much of his childhood taking care of his sick mother or sick himself. He missed school the first week of October 1947 and passed the time listening to the World Series on the radio. That's when he became a New York Yankees fan.

While still in high school he was hired at the Weatherford Democrat to help cover local football games and the writing bug took hold. He had two years of employment at the Democrat when he came to Weatherford College in 1953, and college president Vernon Parrott called him to his office during the first week of class.

"For a freshman student, to have the president call you into his office you begin to wonder what's going on," Vandagriff said. "Well, I sat down. He was typing, and the room was very silent for a little bit. Then he turned around and said, 'Jon, are you working at the Democrat?' and I said, 'Yes, sir.' And he said, 'Would you like to

be the press representative for Weatherford College?' I said, 'Yes, sir!' And immediately he turned around and typed out a little press pass. It said: 'Jon Vandagriff, as press representative for Weatherford College, is entitled to attend any college event free of charge.' Better than that, it said I would have excused cuts from classes. How great an introduction to college is that?"

Sports and writing were Vandagriff's first two loves, but his third and greatest lifelong interest was introduced in Bill Raupe's history classroom.

"In class we had three walls of blackboard and he would start on a Civil War battle and go all the way around the room or a Texas battle and go all the way around," Vandagriff said. "And I realized then that's what I really wanted to do. I really wanted to know about history."

### WC HONORS OUTSTANDING ALUMNI



Weatherford College recognized three former students during the annual Alumni Awards Luncheon in April.

The college honored Dr. Molly Harris and Keith Loftis as Distinguished Alumni Award recipients, and Jon Vandagriff was named the 2019 Alumnus of the Year.

Vandagriff is a 1955 graduate of WC, an award-winning journalist, a former college faculty member and celebrated author (see cover story for more information).

Harris is a 1998 graduate of WC and is currently assistant to the president at Grayson College and adjunct speech instructor at WC. She reflected on her time as a Coyote and how people like Mike Endy and Dr. Jim Boyd set her on her path – Boyd by inspiring her to pursue higher education leadership and Endy who pushed her to move on in her academic career after accumulating 110 credit hours at WC.

"Had it not been for those two moments in my life I may

still be a student at Weatherford College, 575 hours later," she joked. "I don't know what would have happened, but I needed that kick out of the nest. And because of that I have kicked several students out of the nest."

Loftis, a 1992 WC alumnus and professional saxophone player, is currently an instructor for the United States Jazz Reach Program in New York and teaches film scoring. He reflected on his introduction to WC while he was a senior in high school who was recruited to fill an open slot in the WC Jazz Band's performance at the national jazz convention in San Diego.

"What really touched me was the family that continues to be here at Weatherford College," he said. "I have so many stories I wish I could tell them all. It is truly a blessing and honor to be able to come home and receive this award."

Vandagriff graduated from WC in 1955 and continued his education at Howard Payne University in Brownwood where he also worked as the assistant sports editor at the Brownwood Bulletin and was a member of the college annual staff.

At Howard Payne, Vandagriff met Dr. Tom Havins who was known as an authority on Texas history. Vandagriff would ask Havins about local places in Parker County by describing the surroundings and Havins would respond with the name and historical significance of the location. That sealed Vandagriff's fate as a historian.

After completing his bachelor's degree at HPU, Vandagriff returned to Weatherford and went back to work at the Democrat working his way up to managing editor.

It was at this point he made the transition from journalist to teacher. He started at Weatherford Middle School teaching social studies and reading before moving on to Tarrant County College as the director of publications and instructor of Texas history.

Now working in higher education, Vandagriff decided he needed to return to school to earn his master's degree in order to secure his position. He completed his master's in journalism from the University of North Texas where he wrote his thesis on the history of the Weatherford Democrat. Vandagriff worked in a variety of offices at Tarrant County College including the district office where he helped set up booths for events like May Fest and the Fort Worth Stock Show and Rodeo.

"I was walking around one day at the rodeo and I noticed the Weatherford College booth," Vandagriff said. "There were a couple of young girls there, and I walked up and said, 'I graduated from Weatherford College before you were born!' They laughed and we talked a little bit. One of them said, 'Do you have a Weatherford College belt buckle? Would you wear it if we gave you

WC Ex-Students organization and became a self-proclaimed ambassador for the college.

"I think Weatherford College has one of the finest faculties you can find anyplace," he said. "The one thing that sets Weatherford College's faculty apart from anywhere else is their interest in students."

He frequently travels and takes along a collection of WC shirts and hats which he wears to start conversations with people near and far about the college, and he's always on the lookout for prospective WC students. He also leaves behind WC pens whereever he goes.

"At Bellingham [International Airport in Washington state] I saw a group of tall girls from Canada headed to a basketball tournament in Las Vegas," he said. "Dottie (his wife) started talking to one of the girl's mom and my wheels began to spin. I got their contact info and sent them information about the school when they got home. You never know."

Vandagriff's latest project in support of his alma mater was spending two years writing "Weatherford College: The First 150 Years" released at the start of the college's sesquicentennial year. He and his wife, Dottie, also created a \$10,000 scholarship fund for history students to kick off the 150th year of WC.

For all of these reasons and so many more, Vandagriff was recognized in April as the 2019 WC Alumnus of the Year.

"Timing is everything," said Brent Baker, WC's vice president of institutional advancement when he introduced Vandagriff during the April awards luncheon. "Could there have been a better time for Jon Vandagriff to win this award? In our sesquicentennial year as we look back on the history and heritage of this institution, could the selection committee have chosen anyone but the man known as Parker County's historian?" 13

- 1. Nineteen students and instructors explored Iceland for seven days in May. Their adventure included learning to axe throw, a dip in a geothermal lagoon, a visit to the Oxarafoss waterfall where scenes from "Game of Thrones" were filmed, a glacier hike, whale watching and a visit to the rift zone where the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates meet.
- 2. Two Weatherford College graduation ceremonies were held on May 11 in the Durant Auditorium at Weatherford High School. With August graduation petitions pending, the total number of degrees earned and certificates completed for the 2018-19 academic year are estimated at 949.
- 3. Dr. Tod Allen Farmer, president of Weatherford College, and Dr. Eric I. Bruntmyer, president of Hardin-Simmons University, signed

- an articulation agreement between the two institutions on May 28. This agreement will make it easier for students to retain course credit when they move from one institution to the other.
- 4. Asana Michelle Onishi took home the top prize in the collegiate division of the inaugural WC International Piano Competition held April 27 in the Alkek Fine Arts Center. Onishi, a student at Northwestern University in Illinois, performed a piece by Joseph Hayden and another by Robert Schumann to take top honors. WC pianist Dr. Hyeyoung Song, who organized the piano competition, was named "Master Pianist" by Dr. Tod Allen Farmer, WC president, following her April 11 concert with violinist Swang Lin in the Alkek Fine Arts Center. Song has instructed piano at WC as artist-in-residence since 2007.











- 5.The WC Business Building was renamed the I.B. Hand Building during a ceremony on April 15. The WC Board of Trustees voted to name the building after Hand, a 1936 graduate of Weatherford College. - 6. WC held its first advanced teen musical theatre camp in June, and after only two weeks of rehearsal the cast and crew of more than 40 youngsters produced a fantastic production of Disney's "Frozen Jr." in the Alkek Fine Arts Center.
- 7. President Farmer participated in the recent presidential inauguration of Dr. Mark A. Hussey at Texas A&M University-Kingsville. Farmer was one of three presidential delegates to the inauguration, participating in multiple facets of the event, including a processional through the

- heart of the campus. Hussey is the 20th president in TAMUK's history, while Farmer is the 20th president in WC's history.
- 8. Coyote basketball coaches mentored approximately 100 aspiring athletes the week of June 10 in a co-ed camp in the Graber Athletic Center. Kindergarten through sixth graders participated in a fundamentals camp while those in seventh through 12th grade were part of a player development camp.



Dr. Scott Tarnowieckyi, a Weatherford College history and social sciences instructor, was announced as the 2019 Faculty Member of the Year during the recent WC commencement ceremony.

"Our recipient demonstrates leadership, promotes scholarship and champions students and fellow faculty members," said Suzie Jary, last year's award recipient, as she introduced Tarnowieckyi. "They have the capability to get the job done seamlessly and smoothly with respect and fun."

Tarnowieckyi has 20 years' experience teaching in higher education, 10 of these at WC. He founded the Interdisciplinary Academic Conference and organizes the Distinguished Kent Miller and Quinton Reeves Lecture Series held each semester.

"When one looks at the list of previous recipients, being in that group is quite the honor," Tarnowieckyi said. "Thinking about my fellow faculty, many of whom were equally deserving of such recognition, being selected by them is quite humbling.

"While I like to think that my success at Weatherford College has been mine alone, I know that it is actually an expression of the great faculty, staff, and administrators who have helped me to be successful whether in the classroom or through other activities like the inaugural Interdisciplinary Academic Conference we held in the spring semester. #### **GLENN TAKES ON VOLUNTEER FUNDRAISING ROLE AT WC**



After 56 years as a local lender, Bob Glenn is moving into investments — helping donors invest in the lives of students.

Glenn, president of the Weatherford College Foundation, has retired from his position as executive vice president of Plains Capital Bank. In May he moved into his new office on the second floor of WC's E.W. Mince Administration Building where he will spend two or three days each week volunteering as

a fundraiser for the foundation.

"Total retirement is not something I desire," Glenn said. "So, after 56 years in Weatherford banking I wanted a new phase in my remaining years. As a native of Weatherford and Parker County, I wanted to give back to the community that has been so good to me. What better way than to be a part of Weatherford College to ensure that students who desire to gain an education have that opportunity."

Glenn is a 1963 WC graduate and was named Alumnus of the

Year in 1997. He has served on the WC Foundation Board of Directors for 12 years and as president since 2014. He chaired the Foundation's successful "The Time is Now for Your College" capital campaign from 2011 to 2013, which raised \$2.4 million on a goal of \$2 million.

"I am very excited that Mr. Glenn has joined our institutional advancement team," said Dr. Tod Allen Farmer, president of Weatherford College. "He was a hometown bank executive for decades. He has the contacts and capacity to raise money and change the lives of both current and future WC students. I have deeply respected him for many years and consider it a great honor to serve with him."

Brent Baker, vice president of institutional advancement, compared Glenn to another iconic WC fundraiser, Carlos Hartnett.

"The first development officer in our college's history, Mr. Hartnett, was also a volunteer retiree," Baker said. "Bob, like Carlos, is a force of nature in this community. There's no better person to help us reach out into the community for the sake of our students."

"I am truly excited to be a part of this great institution," Glenn said. "I hope to assist in celebrating WC's 150 years as the window and lighthouse of Weatherford and Parker County!"

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### ATHLETICS YEAR IN REVIEW

The WC rodeo team enjoyed one of their most successful seasons to date, sending seven competitors--a school record--to the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming.

Three team members left Casper as national top 10 finishers: Leighton Berry (fifth in bareback riding), Bristan Kennedy (sixth in barrel racing) and Kasen Brennise (seventh in tie down roping).

Women's teams fared well in National Junior College Athletic Association play, with basketball and softball qualifying for the postseason again.

The Lady Coyote basketball team advanced to the Region V Tournament after finishing third in the Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference. Their final record was 19-8.

The WC softball team hosted the Region V North Tournament, believed to be the first regional tournament ever hosted by the college. The Coyotes fared well at Stuart Field, advancing to the semifinals with a 34-21 overall record.

The baseball team finished at 31-23 overall and saw two former Coyotes selected in the Major League Baseball Draft in June: Jake Lyons of Oklahoma State (22nd round, Baltimore Orioles) and Mitchell Walters of Wichita State (35th round, Tampa Bay Rays).

The men's basketball team posted a 13-16 overall record with a roster of nine freshmen and three sophomores. Head coach Mark Osina was named to the NTJCAC Hall of Fame for his 22 years of coaching and 400-plus victories at WC.
