# 18 REASONS TO CELEBRATE CANYON WEST GIFT 'LIFTS WC TO THE NEXT LEVEL'

Donations come in many shapes and sizes. Generous donors give checks, stocks, life insurance policies, art, and even homes.

But an entire golf course is another matter altogether.

When the word began to circulate that Richard and Nancy Stuart were donating Canyon West Golf Course to Weatherford College, the community noticed. The largest gift in the history of the college has reverberated throughout the Parker County area. And it kicked off a chorus of questions.

Will it still be a golf course? What can the college do with a golf course? Will it still be called Canyon West? Can I book a tee time?

"The generosity of the Stuarts will allow WC to add new programs such as culinary arts and turf management, not to mention what it will do for our golf program," said President Tod Allen Farmer. "Additionally, we will be able to hold alumni and various community events in the beautiful Canyon West clubhouse."

And yes, it will remain a working golf course, retaining its current membership roster and remaining open to the public. A name change was discussed briefly, but the Stuarts have built an impeccable reputation since they acquired the course in 2012, so the Canyon West name remains.

Originally opened in 1997, the course is a 6,653-yard, par-72 tract south of Interstate 20 in southwest Parker County, part of the Brock community. The Stuarts have invested an incredible amount of time and money in continuously improving the course over the past 11 years. Richard has been a fixture at Canyon West, seeing his vision of an even better golf experience come to fruition

with an endless series of daily decisions, modifications and overall improvements.

So why donate the course to Weatherford College?

"Both Richard and I know that education is so important in improving our community and nation, as well as helping young people achieve their dreams," Nancy said. "Our parents helped us look to the future, and we hope our support in this direction will build a strong Weatherford College to support achievers in their pursuit of the future, and help others along the way."

The Stuarts have spent the past two decades getting to know Weatherford College, and trust was built on those experiences. Nancy has served as vice president of the WC Foundation for many years, and they have been among the college's top donors on multiple high-profile projects. Plus, as founders of Chicken Express, they have funded the WC education of countless restaurant employees, investing in young people that they knew first hand.

"We choose Weatherford College because this is our home and community, we are proud of them and what the college does to make all of our students stars and achievers," she said. "WC can give any student the individual attention they need and still be close to home."

The Stuarts are pleased and the college is grateful. But what about the golfers?

"I have been a member at Canyon West for almost 10 years," said Shannon Hart, local business owner and Brock ISD School Board member. "In that time, Richard has made thousands of dollars in improvements all over the course. The fact that the college is taking over will only enhance what is the crown jewel of Parker County golf courses. I look forward to seeing what the college will bring to Canyon West for many years to come."

Since the announcement of the gift, many people have worked behind the scenes to make the transfer a reality, including college staff, the WC Board of Trustees, golf course employees, attorneys and, of course, the Stuart Family. It was more complicated than most expected, but the transfer officially closed on October 23rd, and Canyon West is now officially a Weatherford College asset.

As the process came to a conclusion, Farmer reflected on what the donation means to Weatherford College.

"This gift lifts WC to the next level," he said. "We are so appreciative and look forward to the amazing future of Canyon West."

## WC WELCOMES YDOYAGA AS NEW VICE PRESIDENT



Born and raised in Dallas with plenty of time spent on the family farm in Corsicana, Dr. Shannon Ydoyaga understands the city and large college systems, but she's also just as comfortable in a smaller community talking about agriculture.

Pair that with more than 20 years of higher education leadership, and she was the perfect candidate for WC's new executive vice president for academic services position.

"WC reminds me a lot of Del Mar College in Corpus Christi," she said. "There are a lot of wonderful faculty, and there's a huge opportunity to give back to the community during a time of tremendous growth in the region."

Prior to her three years at Del Mar where she served as the dean for health sciences and professional education, Ydoyaga established her higher education career at Dallas College where her 13-year term of service saw her as an associate dean and a district director. Most recently she served as the vice president for academic affairs at the South Campus of Tarrant County College.

In her new role at Weatherford College, Ydoyaga will provide leadership for academic programs, faculty and support services. She will also work closely with industry partners to develop curriculum and training aligned with emerging workforce needs.

"We want to have a full offering of programs to serve the community and align with where the jobs are," she said. "So, for the next year or two we'll be spending a lot of time doing new program development to align with job demands, meet industry standards and make sure we're operating from a place of instructional excellence."

To achieve that goal, WC has a talented pool of faculty entering a new promotion and rank system that Ydoyaga has the pleasure of implementing. She said the new system will help create pathways for career progression for existing faculty.

"The faculty at WC are innovative," she said. "They care about the students and are passionate about the areas in which they teach. I'm so excited to listen and learn what their needs are so that I can help serve them."

She is also eager to serve the WC community and looks forward to building strong partnerships with area school districts and universities to create seamless pathways for students. For now, she's learning what's in place and what's working well.

"I want to respect the history and understand the culture," Ydoyaga said. "If things are working you don't want to disrupt that, you want to embrace it."

Ydoyaga earned her Doctor of Philosophy in Education Leadership degree from Capella University. She also holds a Master of Science in Management from Texas A&M University-Commerce and a Bachelor of Business Administration from the University of Mississippi.

"Dr. Ydoyaga believes in the community college mission," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer, "and the opportunities it brings to transform the lives of students and their families by building educational pathways to jobs of the future, while developing core general education knowledge, skills and abilities with the whole student in mind in preparation of emerging technologies."

# ENROLLN

Official numbers for the Fall 2023 semester enrollment were announced at the September meeting of the Weatherford College Board of Trustees.

As of Monday, Sept. 11, there were 5,547 students enrolled in WC, as compared to 5,337 students last year. This represents a 4.4 percent increase.

WC Wise County is up 16.3 percent with 499 students this

year as compared to 418 this time last year.



The number of international students is also up this year with 77 students from 37 countries including Brazil, Chad, Denmark, France, India, The Philippines, Serbia, South Sudan, Ukraine, and Vietnam.

# WC'S BOSWELL APPOINTED TO TEXAS BOARD OF NURSING



Governor Greg Abbott announced the appointment of Kathy Boswell to the Texas Board of Nursing in August.

Boswell is the Dean of Health and Human Sciences for Weatherford College and established the college's associate degree nursing program in 2000.

"It is an honor and a privilege to have been asked by the governor to serve on the Texas Board of Nursing," she said. "I am excited to begin my term and join the current board members who serve this great state and the profession of nursing."

Boswell is a member of the Texas Association of Deans and Directors of Professional Nursing Programs and the Texas Association of Vocational Nurse Educators and a former member of the American Nursing Association.

Additionally, she volunteers as the chairwoman of the City of Mineral Wells Parks and Recreation Board and for the American Red Cross Youth Swim Program.

A WC alumna, she also earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a Master of Science from Texas Woman's University.

Her term on the State Board of Nursing goes through Jan. 31, 2029.

The board oversees the practice of professional nursing, examination of students, and standards of professional conduct for license holders. The board also prescribes and publishes the minimum requirements and standards for course studies in various nursing degree programs.

"I am pleased that Governor Abbott accepted the nomination and appointed Dean Kathy Boswell to serve on the Texas Board of Nursing," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. # MCKINLEY, EMBRY SCHOLARSHIPS BECOME PERMANENT ENDOWMENTS





Sports have been important threads in the fabric of Weatherford College student life for decades, and there is no better evidence than the establishment of two new WC Foundation scholarship funds.

First, it took only 10 days for friends of the McKinley family to contribute enough funds to establish a permanent scholarship endowment in their honor. Multiple donors gave to honor longtime WC Athletic Director Bob McKinley, his late wife Dee, and their children, WC staff members Trey and Traci with the McKinley Family Scholarship.

"It would be a challenge for anyone to identify a family which has given more of themselves to our beloved Weatherford College than the McKinley family," said Warren Creason, a WC Foundation Board member and a friend of the family who spearheaded the effort. "This is not only for the McKinley family, but for all the deserving future Weatherford College students this scholarship will benefit so greatly."

Creason was also very instrumental in the effort to raise scholarship funds to honor Rod Embry, a WC distinguished alumnus who dedicated more than 30 years as the college's golf coach. When Embry passed away July 2nd, Creason and a number of alumni wanted to honor the coach's memory. He reached out to his friend and former Coyote golf team member Ruel Hamilton, who played for Embry in the 1970s.

Hamilton answered the call, pledging to raise and/or donate \$100,000 to the Rod Embry Scholarship over the next five years. "Rod was one of the finest Christian men I have ever met," Hamilton said. "I have always felt that having Rod there at that stage in my life was like winning the lottery, except that what I got out of it was more valuable than money.

"He was not just our coach, he was also a role model," Hamilton said. "We knew that we were more than just his players. He cared for us and was more concerned about what kind of men we would become than what kind of golfers we were."

## PRESIDENTIAL LUNCHEON







Dr. Tod Allen Farmer hosted another successful Presidential Luncheon in the Alkek Fine Arts Center in September. The crowd, made up of community members, students and WC employees, enjoyed music from the WC Jazz Orchestra, emcee work by Volleyball Coach Kailee May, comments from Distinguished Alumna Jamie Bodiford Brinkley, and President Farmer's annual address. Traci McKinley won the Presidential Service Award, Keri Waller took home a Presidential Core Value Coin, and the crowd celebrated another banner WC year.





Instructors at Weatherford College are taking a proactive approach to artificial intelligence and its impact on the classroom.

Professors Marcie DeChiara and Jared Stewart spoke about the pros and cons of AI during in-service sessions and at a recent meeting of the WC Board of Trustees.

Stewart explained the positives of AI for instructors, including time savings provided by automating tasks like lesson plans, thereby freeing up creative energy for mentorship and additional student support.

For students, AI offers instant access to virtual tutors to help summarize texts, clarify classroom concepts and rephrase lessons in their language for non-native English speakers.

DeChiara addressed how AI can harm academic integrity as students attempt to pass AI-created text as their own. Instructors face further dilemmas in detecting AI-written papers.

"We thought, in the beginning, we would be able to use AI against itself to detect AI writing," she said. "That has not been the case. It cannot reliably detect itself."

One way to counteract these pitfalls is for instructors to change their assignments.

"So we can be assured that students are learning at every stage as opposed to relying on technology to have a computer read what a computer wrote and then a human give a grade to it," DeChiara said. "That is the worst outcome we could have with AI. Otherwise, it has great potential."

Staff in the Speaker Jim Wright Library are also prepared to guide students on academic integrity when using AI.

The college IT department has also set up an instructional hub to keep faculty and staff educated on the latest happenings in AI.

"I can tell you we're on the cusp of this, and we're doing a lot better than a lot of other institutions are in trying to think ahead about how AI fits into academia," Stewart said. "I'm really proud to be part of this team."
