### **ALL-AMERICANS AND ALL-TIMERS**

### RODRIGUEZ AND VILLENEUVE HELPTAKEWC BASEBALL TO NEW HEIGHTS

They came to Weatherford from different countries and didn't speak the same language. One traveled 20 miles to get here, the other 1,700.

They played together for one magical year and then moved on to universities in separate states and different time zones.

But Ryne Rodriguez and Robin Villeneuve will always be linked in Weatherford College baseball history as the school's first All-Americans and the foundation of their first World Series run—one of the greatest seasons in the history of WC sports.

Villeneuve came to Texas from Quebec, Canada, two years ago. He was first a pitcher, then converted to a full-time hitter. The center field wall at Sam Suplizio Field in Grand Junction, Colorado, can tell you that offense is Villeneuve's strong suit, still bearing a dent from one of his 400-foot blasts. He hit four home runs at the NJCAA Division I World Series, including the walk-off game winner in the Coyotes' first-ever World Series game. He led the nation in home runs with 28 on the season and had the second-most RBI in the country with 102.

Rodriguez spent his one year at WC after graduating from Trinity Valley School in Fort Worth. The left-handed pitcher was

WC's ace, with one of the lowest earned run averages in the nation at 1.59. He was credited with 11 wins and zero losses in 2023, and he was a workhorse all year long, logging 90 and two-thirds innings—fifth in the country. In the World Series, he threw more innings than any pitcher in Grand Junction.

Villeneuve was the conference Hitter of the Year; Rodriguez was the Pitcher of the Year. Both made the World Series All-Tournament team. Both made first-team All-America.

Both broke school records: Villeneuve for home runs, RBI (102) and slugging percentage (.899); Rodriguez for wins and innings.

No one outside of the WC locker room predicted this breakout season. But when asked if he expected it, Rodriguez didn't hesitate.

"I did," he said. "Coach [Jeff] Lightfoot and his coaches always put together a competitive team, and this year's team was the best one I've been a part of. I'm sure my teammates can say the same. Everyone got along on and off the field, and our team and the coaches always stayed in the game no matter the circumstances."

Villeneuve wasn't quite as confident going into the season.

"Nah, honestly, I knew we had a really good team, but I didn't expect us to play like that," he said of their record-breaking 53-11 year. "I feel like everyone played better than what people expected."

Even though the modern era of Coyote baseball has seen much success since its inception in 2003, WC never had a baseball All-American. But when it was all said and done in 2023, Lightfoot had two in the same year.

"You don't have a special season without special players," he said. "These two guys put up elite number, and they did it consistently all year and throughout the postseason. These guys are great players but even better young men. They have a work ethic and a competitive mindset to match their talent."


That mindset and talent have landed both of them in the Southeastern Conference (SEC) next year, the highest level of the NCAA in most sports, including college baseball. Villeneuve will play at the University of Tennessee and Rodriguez at the University of Mississippi (Ole Miss). They will both perform in front of big crowds, on television, and most likely in the postseason.

And they will very likely face each other one-on-one in multiple at-bats that fans back in Weatherford will want to watch.

"It's gonna be nice to face an ex-teammate," Villeneuve said. As usual, Rodriguez had a different reaction.


"Man, that would be awesome but scary at the same time... he's an incredible hitter. After playing with him for a year, I know where not to throw it."

While negotiations are ongoing and the WC Board of Trustees will consider accepting the generous gift later this summer, it will be the largest gift in WC history once completed.

Canyon West, originally opened in 1997, is an award-winning 6,653-yard, par 72 golf course in southwest Parker County in the Brock community. The Stuarts purchased the course in late 2012.

The college plans to continue operating Canyon West as a golf course, retaining its

current members and remaining open to the public. It will also benefit the college with room for potential instructional programs in turf management, culinary arts and others.

WC will use the course's pavilion and clubhouse for special events and other uses. The college's men's golf team and women's golf team (added for 2023-24) will also utilize the course.

"Nancy and Richard Stuart have already helped countless WC students make a better life for themselves and their families," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. "This transformational gift will support new and existing academic, workforce and athletic programs for generations to come."

The Stuarts are among the most generous donors in Weatherford College history, giving to support scholarships, artificial turf for softball and baseball, Steinway pianos and other projects. WC's softball facility, Stuart Field, is named in their honor, and Nancy Stuart serves as vice president of the WC Foundation.

"We are very pleased to help Weatherford College in this way," Nancy Stuart said. "We think this will enhance the college's programs and put WC on an even higher level."

# CONSTRUCTION ON SCHEDULE FOR DURANT HALL











Imperial Construction, Jerry and Vickie Durant, and WC celebrated the ongoing construction of Durant Hall with a beam signing ceremony on the morning of June 22.

WC President Tod Allen Farmer spoke briefly about the new student housing facility's impact on recruiting thanks to the generosity of the Durant's donation toward the project. The Durants said they were honored to continue their support of the college.

Jon Jones, VP of operations for Imperial, provided details about the facility, which will include 57,000 square feet, four stories, and 116 beds reserved for WC Honors Program students and athletes. The new facility will also include a weight room, cardio room, a multipurpose room for activities like yoga and Pilates, and an expansive balcony. Construction is anticipated to be complete in the first quarter of 2024.

# WC GRAD IS MOVIN' ON UP FROM COLLEGE PARK TO CENTRAL PARK

### **AUSTRALIAN PIANIST TAKES HIS MUSIC EDUCATION TO NYC**

Weatherford College graduate and pianist Xavier Kim always knew he would travel to the United States for his education because of its eclectic music scene.

The problem was that after visiting a wide variety of schools in North Texas, he just couldn't decide which school he wanted to attend. It took some fatherly intuition to set him on the path to Parker County's own college on the hill.

"My dad works in Fort Worth and worked with Weatherford College," he explained. "He was meeting and talking about some digital agriculture stuff he was working on and found out that they have a music program. He talked to Dean Duane Durrett and said I should come to check it out. I was offered a scholarship and it looked like a great way to spend two years getting my basics done before I branched out to somewhere else."

Xavier started playing the piano in Australia at a young age after his mom asked him one day in the car if he wanted to take some lessons. Most young piano students start by playing traditional classical music, including Xavier, but he didn't like that technique and decided to take a four-year break.

It wasn't until middle school that he started to play the piano again, but this time it was jazz and not classical music. It was the broad style and complex harmonies of jazz music that has kept Xavier playing all these years, paving quite a musical path.

"I love jazz because of the creativity and the communication you can have between other musicians. I feel like jazz is improvising and being creative; you can really let your personality shine," he said. "It's a collaborative form of music with drummers, bass and horn players, and other musicians. It is awesome how well you can communicate with the other people just by playing music."

Xavier said it wasn't much of a culture shock coming to the United States from Australia. One of his favorite things back home was Mexican food, but in Australia it was Tex-Mex and not authentic Mexican food. He says he was able to learn a lot about Mexican culture and grew to love it. He also learned a lot about himself these past couple of years.

"Weatherford College has given me a lot of room to grow and become a leader and more confident person. I've been a student worker for the past year and led numerous orientations. I've also had opportunities to go out and play by myself at clubs and concerts during my free time. For college, I've led the jazz band and been sent out to play on occasions for school in Dallas and Arlington. I've become a more confident leader."

Durrett agrees that Xavier shows leadership traits both in and out of the classroom.

"Xavier is an incredible student, musician and young man. Xavier graduated this spring semester from WC, and because of all the talent and hard work he brought, he and our jazz program grew," Durrett said. "He is the type of student that makes good programs great. Along with his school-related music performances, he and fellow student musician Nuri Han perform in the community, on campus, and for the Arlington Memorial Hospital, which the WC Music program provides music monthly. He is an excellent ambassador for WC."

Xavier's hard work and talents earned him a scholarship to the City University of New York (CUNY) where he will begin classes there this fall to earn a bachelor's degree in jazz performance.

"I want to stay in the city and be present in the jazz scene there. Eventually, I might go on to Europe and go back home. As of right now, I want to spend the foreseeable future in New York," Kim said. "I would love to have a 10-year career in the city working, playing music, meeting new people. Later down the road, I wouldn't mind getting my master's degree at Julliard."

Even though Xavier is excited to be headed to New York in a couple of months, he will miss WC. This small-town college has left a lasting impact on him in the short time he has been here, preparing him for the next step in his educational journey.

"I've met so many good people here in the 2.5 years I've been here," he said. "Many awesome people, like the staff that helps around the school. I've met a lot of awesome students and made lifelong friends."

# TWO COWBOYS WIN RESERVE NATIONAL CHAMPION TITLES





Year after year, Weatherford College athletes are among the best at the College National Finals Rodeo, and this year was no different.

WC's Dawson Gleaves and Jace Helton both earned reserve national champion honors after finishing as runners-up in their events in Casper, Wyoming.

Gleaves turned in an 80.5 ride in the finals, his best of the week. Nicknamed "Sticky," the Amarillo native finished with 233.5 on four bulls, only 2.5 points behind two-time national champ Tristen Hutchings of Sul Ross State University and 67.5 ahead of the third-place competitor.

WC's Jace Helton (heeler) and Quade Hiatt (header) of West Texas A&M University finished second in team roping despite a 10.5 in the finals, their slowest time of the week. They finished with 29.1 on four. The run helped Hiatt win the men's All-Around national championship.

The combined points from Gleaves and Helton gave WC a sixth-place men's team finish with  $470~\rm points$ .

This was Weatherford College's 19th consecutive College National Finals Rodeo.

## **DONATION FROM BETTY JO GRABER ESTATE**



The Weatherford College Foundation has announced it has received a gift of more than \$155,000 from the Betty Jo Graber estate.

Graber coached women's basketball at Weatherford College for 35 years and was a former member of the WC Board of Trustees. She passed away in January at the age of 90.

"Betty Jo Graber had a profoundly positive impact on countless Weatherford College students throughout her professional life as both a coach and WC trustee," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. "This bequest will continue that lasting influence on WC students for generations to come."

The new endowed scholarship will be earmarked for players and managers in the women's basketball program.

After coaching at Weatherford High School from 1954 to 1956, Graber joined the WC coaching staff, where she served until her retirement in 1991. She was a national pioneer for women's basketball at the two-year college level and was inducted into six halls of fame, including the inaugural class of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tennessee.

She was also involved in international basketball, serving with national teams for

the United States for eight years, including as a manager of the 1984 gold medalwinning Olympic Team.

WC's gymnasium is the Betty Jo Graber Athletic Center and the female student athlete of the year award from the National Junior College Athletic Association is the Betty Jo Graber Award.


"Betty Jo was instrumental in the growth and development of NJCAA women's basketball," said WC Foundation President Brent Gough. "Her involvement as a coach at many levels, regional director, as well as numerous other pivotal positions all contributed to growing the sport to the point it is today. We are thankful for her gift and the opportunities that it will provide for other athletes to follow in her footsteps."






### VALEDICTORIAN DUAL CREDIT GRADUATES

Two 2023 Weatherford College graduates were also named top in their respective high school classes weeks after finishing their associate degrees. WC asked them about their experience as simultaneous high school and college students. (Answers have been edited for length and clarity.)





#### **MARIAH HERNANDEZ**

Mariah Hernandez is the valedictorian of the 2023 class from Mineral Wells High School.

When did you start dual credit classes? Freshman year.

Did you plan to complete your associate degree by the end of high school? Not at first. But when I heard of a senior completing their degree, I asked my Upward Bound advisor what an associate degree was. I then decided to take more courses in my last two years in high school to complete my associate's in December 2022.

Was it more difficult than you anticipated? I have always been studious and knew that setting this goal for myself would require extra effort and time.

How did you manage high school classes, college classes and finish as valedictorian of your high school class? I remember times when I would complete my homework and study for tests on weekends. I didn't mind having to manage college classes and high school classes at the same time because I knew it would pay off in the long run. I always get my work done before making plans with friends and family.

Were you involved in TRiO? Yes, Upward Bound provided me with many opportunities and taught me numerous things about the college experience. Upward Bound has a summer program every year that allows us to get college experience by staying in the dorms while also having fun summer activities.

Advice to the next set of students in your shoes? I encourage students to apply for the Upward Bound TRiO program. They help students in so many ways with anything college related.

What are your education plans? I am attending The University of Texas at Arlington for my Bachelor of Science in Nursing in the fall. I will then continue my education to get a master's in nursing.

What are your future goals? My future goals involve helping people better their health by working in the medical field. I want to work at a pediatric hospital.

#### YARENI DAVILA CABRERA

Yareni Davila Cabrera is the valedictorian of the 2023 class from Gordon High School. **When did you start dual credit classes?** Freshman year.

Did you plan to complete your associate degree by the end of high school? When I first started high school, I was just taking classes because I knew it would give me a head start. Luckily, during my senior year, my counselor and I saw the opportunity that I could finish with my associate's, so that's what I did!

Was it more difficult than you anticipated? There were some instances where I doubted

my ability to handle a larger course load due to my already busy plate, but thankfully I was able to handle that and much more.

How did you manage high school classes, college classes and finish as valedictorian of your high school class? It was not easy, and I had to push myself outside the classroom and manage my time so that I could turn in assignments on time while balancing sports and my outside life.


