





WC celebrated the grand opening of the Nan and Bob Kingsley Building in December of 2021. The event was befitting of a member of the Radio Hall of Fame, including recording artists such as Michael Martin Murphey and Red Steagall. The Weatherford and East Parker County chambers of commerce were on hand to celebrate the event. Trustee Doug Dowd, the great-great-great grandson of President David Switzer, and his family were on hand to dedicate the new Presidents Hall.

BACHELOR'S DEGREES



Only a few short years ago, the idea of bachelor's degree programs at Weatherford College was just that, an idea.

Now WC has graduated its first class of students from the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program and the first cohort of students in the Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Organizational Leadership is well on its way to graduation.

Higher education is not immune to the ever-increasing cost of living, and the cost of a bachelor's degree is out of reach for many. But community colleges can change that trajectory.

"This trend must be reversed if we are to maintain a highly qualified workforce," said WC President Tod

Allen Farmer. "The continued economic prosperity of both our citizens and our society depends on an educated labor pool abundant with skilled workers."

Based on 15 hours per semester in both the fall and spring, the annual costs of tuition and fees at Tarleton State University for undergraduates are \$9,728 per year, and at TCU, it is \$51,660 per year. The same courses at WC cost in-district students \$3,460 in tuition and fees.

After one year of online classes, the first class completed the RN-to-BSN program in August for under \$8,500 per student.

At the same time the second group of students began the BSN program, Dr. Philip Mathew launched the BAAS in Organizational Leadership.

"It was a great opportunity to serve the students and community in our region as it opened up a pathway for students who have professional/technical backgrounds to continue their studies at the bachelor's level," Mathew said. "Many of our graduates received new jobs and promotions while in the bachelor's program or soon after graduation. The degree, along with their initiative and hard work, opened up new doors and opportunities they never thought possible."

In the fall of 2021, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved WC's third bachelor's degree, a medical and health services management degree. Courses in that program are slated to begin in the Fall 2022 semester.

WC administrators are eyeing the institution's first engineering degree—a bachelor's in robotics and automation engineering—and an elementary teaching degree with English as a second language certification.

While WC is forging ahead into the realm of baccalaureate programs, only 15 of Texas' 50 community college districts offer bachelor's degrees.

"Weatherford College is strongly committed to affordable bachelor's degrees," Farmer said. "We are simultaneously expanding our students' educational opportunities and supplying the skilled labor pool demanded by our business community. We currently offer, and will increasingly offer, some of the most affordable bachelor's degrees in the nation."

DUAL CREDIT AT WC



A YEAR IN REVIEW - LEGENDS AND LEGACIES

WC didn't have just one alumnus win a pro rodeo world championship, it had two! At the 2021 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, Jordon Peterson Briggs won the barrel racing title and Sawyer Gilbert won the breakaway roping title. They are the first WC alumni to win world rodeo championships.

Former Weatherford College softball player Morgan Rackel won a bronze medal in the Tokyo Olympic games. Rackel adds another chapter to WC's proud Olympic history (Betty Jo Graber, basketball, 1984; Jake Arrieta, baseball, 2008; Marius Prekevicius, basketball, 2008; Lewis Banda, track and field, 2004 and 2008).

WC will have volleyball for the first time in the Fall 2022 semester, and Kailee May is the team's first head coach. May brings coaching experience from the University of Texas at Arlington and Stephen F. Austin State University.

Thanks to the help of generous donors, WC now has artificial turf on Roger Williams Ballpark and Stuart Field. The Williams Ballpark turf install took place in the summer of 2021. WC is the only institution in NJCAA Region V to have artificial turf for baseball and softball.

Two Coyotes were drafted by Major League Baseball franchises in June. Carlos Tavera is now a member of the Baltimore Orioles organization and Brenden Dixon is a Pittsburgh Pirate.

Bob McKinley's Lady Coyote basketball team was the Cinderella story of 2021. Despite entering the postseason tournament as the No. 5 seed, they stormed through the bracket, winning three games as the underdog to claim the conference tournament title. In the regional title game, they were one buzzer-beater shot away from a national tournament berth.

SONOGRAPHY PROGRAM RANKED BEST IN TEXAS

Nursing Process, an online educational resource created by educators and healthcare professionals, named WC's Diagnostic Medical Sonography program as the best ultrasound school in Texas based on the program's acceptance rate, graduation rate, faculty credentials, school reputation, affordability and other factors.

PHI THETA KAPPA WIN EXCELLENCE AWARD

WC's Phi Chapter of the Phi Theta Kappa honor society received a Reach Reward for excellence in membership development in Spring 2021. Additionally, PTK advisor Shantee Siebuhr was awarded the Advisor Horizon Award and PTK students Jay Love, Jo McClendon, Crislan McFarlin and Carey Price were named to the 2022 All-Texas Academic Team.

DR. MATHEW PUBLISHES LEADERSHIP BOOK

Dr. Philip Mathew, director of WC's Bachelor of Applied Arts and Science in Organizational Leadership, published a new book in 2021: "Finding Leo: Servant Leadership as Paradigm, Power, and Possibility."

PRESIDENTIAL SERVICE AWARD WINNER

Larry Gillespie was presented with the 2021 Weatherford College Presidential Service Award for his exceptional service in September during President Farmer's annual Presidential Address. Gillespie, a 22-year employee of WC and audio-visual technician, is often the go-to for both employees and students when they have technical issues with their computers or mobile devices.



WC WISE COUNTY REFINANCED

Weatherford College and Wise County refinanced \$22 million in bonds from an 8 percent interest rate to 2.36 percent in April. The lower interest rate will result in savings of more than \$12.4 million over the lifetime of the bonds. Work on the campus located between Decatur and Bridgeport began over a decade ago, and to see the campus become a reality, voters approved a branch campus maintenance tax to pay for construction and operations. Wise County built the building

and leases it to WC. At the time, a partnership like this between a community college and a county was unheard of by bond rating agencies, resulting in a high-interest rate. The bonds will be paid off in August 2034, as originally planned.

DIRECT PATH FOR STUDENTS FROM WC TO TSU

Weatherford College and Tarleton State University signed a memorandum of understanding in April further solidifying the partnership between the two higher education institutions and providing additional financial aid to Weatherford students transferring to the Stephenville university. The MOU allows all WC students with a minimum 3.0 grade point average to transfer to Tarleton and receive additional funds through Tarleton's Transfer Guaranteed Award (T-GAP) Program based on their GPA and number of hours enrolled. Student life at Weatherford College made a steady return in 2021 with a mix of virtual and in-person events.

To welcome students back for the 2021-22 academic year, Welcome Week provided a variety of activities including a comedy show, magician, caricature artists and a movie night.

The campus cookout and pep rally both made their triumphant return in the fall semester while

clubs began hosting in-person events again like the Coco movie night put on by the Hispanos Unidos (Spanish Club). And the Office of Student Life also presented several successful career and transfer fairs and job fairs.

College leaders launched ROOTS – Resources Open Opportunities to Students, WC’s new five-year quality enhancement plan required as part of the accreditation process.

The goal of ROOTS is to increase student awareness and use of various resources on campus to help them achieve academic success.

New students are introduced to campus through the new full-day Coyote Orientation Registration Experience (CORE) with multiple dates throughout the spring and summer to better meet the needs of students' schedules.





FINE ARTS RETURNS TO CENTER STAGE

WC alumni Keith Loftis and Shaun Martin added to the ever-expanding number of Grammy nominations garnered by former Coyotes. Martin and the band Snarky Puppy received their fourth nomination for Best Contemporary Instrumental Album, "Live at the Royal Albert Hall" in March. Loftis is a central fixture on "Generations" by The Baylor Project which was nominated for Best Jazz Vocal Album in November. A total of 35 former WC students have participated in Grammy Award-winning recordings or performances.

The Weatherford College International Piano Competition continued to grow and spread the name of WC across the globe. The third annual event received 126 applications from across the world in March 2021 with 24 being selected as finalists in two age categories.

Contestants submitted their entries virtually with several of the winners performing live in the Alkek Fine Arts Center during Fall 2021.

After an unprecedented break due to COVID, theatre returned to the Alkek Stage in 2021. In the Fall 2021 semester, the theatre program showcased the musical "The Hunchback of Notre Dame."

The Fall 2021 semester also saw several faculty changes and adjustments in fine arts. Rob Laney transitioned from the director of the college choir to chair of fine arts. Opera and voice instructor Rick Rainey assumed the direction of the choir and became director of vocal activities. Rebecca James was hired as a full-time art instructor and director of visual arts, filling the space left vacant by the retirement of Myrlan Coleman.

RECORD BREAKING PHILANTHROPY

Weatherford College Foundation donors continue to break records in their support of students.

After \$1.2 million in contributions to the foundation in the 2019-20 fiscal year, the most in the college's history, donors followed with an amazing \$2.2 million in gifts in 2020-21.

To put that in perspective, the total eclipses the previous three years combined.

WC Foundation President Bob Glenn is a big factor in the increase—he has personally raised more than \$600,000 in student scholarships as a volunteer in less than three years.


“Our scholarship program has really caught fire,” Glenn said. “When donors hear that it only takes a minimum of \$10,000 to start a permanent endowment, and that you have the option of paying it out over several years, they realize that they, too can make a difference.”

The foundation also provides assistance with the Student Emergency Fund and with private support to augment projects like artificial turf, the All-Steinway campaign and other upcoming projects.

WEATHERFORD COLLEGE LAUNCHES HONORS PROGRAM

It's been said that you get out what you put in, and that's the philosophy behind WC's new Honors Program.

The program launched in 2021 with a focused number of students attacking courses with more academic rigor.

"Our mission with this program is to foster the intellectual, creative and personal growth of innovative and curious students," said Traci McKinley, director of institutional assessment. "To achieve this, we've collaborated to develop advanced curriculum based on inquiry, research and a dedication to lifelong learning and leadership."

Honors Program participants are eligible for WC Foundation scholarships, priority registration, sponsorship for Phi Theta Kappa honor society membership, smaller class sizes, free printing and a designated Honors Program lounge for studying.

The program's graduates will have the honors designation listed on their transcripts and diplomas and have a special mention during honors convocation and commencement ceremonies. They will also wear honors regalia during commencement.




